

HOBBY HINT: If you have trouble with your rock specimens scratching your glass or wooden display shelves, put 3 or 4 drops of silicon rubber on the bottoms of the troublemakers. #### GREETINGS TO THE SEARCHERS FROM SAN SIMEON, CALIFORNIA:

We started out July at the Richardson Ranch hunting Thundereggs. They have other material on the ranch also but the Thundereggs are the best collecting. One of the beds — the plume Thundereggs — is only open on holidays. So I got to go in there over the 4th of July.

The Madras show consisted mainly of dealers (about 75). There weren't any showcases but they did have some videos and evening entertainment.

After the Madras show we headed Southeast toward Lakeview which is almost to the California border. Our destination was Virgin Valley, Nevada which is 100 miles East of Lakeview. The only town we passed through on the way to Virgin Valley was Adel which consisted of one general store including a bar, restaurant and gas station.

Near the Virgin Valley turnoff is a CCC camp where you can park. They did have hot running spring water that fed a swimming hole plus a one temperature shower that ran tontinuously. It was 84° but felt good after digging in the dirt all day long.

I chose the Rainbow Ridge mine to collect. At opening time the owner uses a big skip loader and takes a load right out of the bank. He dumped it near the tailings and you could dig through it fairly easy. The dirt was clay and if wet came out in big chunks. For \$40 you got to dig in the pile until finished then you could hunt the tailings. This all went on from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM. I found some white opal with fire. My prize was a good piece of black opal with brilliant fire which I found in the tailings. It appears to be stable since it was laying out for some time. Everything else I put in water to save it in case it wasn't stable.

There was another mine - Royal Peacock that you could dig in the clay for \$45 a day. Everyone I talked to said it was very hard work.

After leaving Virgin Valley I stopped outside of Plush, Oregon to collect sunstones. BLM has set aside 2600 acres for rockhounds. It is best to collect on a sunny day as the stones glisten. I just collected the ones on the surface. They ranged in size from sand to 1/2 inch.

We entered the Northeast corner of Claifornia and stopped at Alturas. From there we drove over to the Lava Beds National Monument. They have lots of Lava Tubes you can enter and explore.

Davis Creek was nearby so I went there to hunt Obsidian. The diggings were among the trees and shady. The Obsidian layer was 3 to 4 feet deep. As I dug the stones out I looked for the colors they were supposed to have. Put them in a pile behind me and the sun happened to stike it. I was discarding some good material so I went back over everything and kept the best.

Our next stop was Redding to visit the Homewood's. They are enjoying small town life.

Heading South again stopped at Clear Lake to look for Lake Diamonds. Found some small ones which are really clear quartz.

We are on our way home now so this concludes our trip reporting. Hope to see you all at the next meeting.



#### JULY FIELD TRIP REPORT:

Our July field trip to the Big Pine area was good. Sorry we did not have more participants. I met the Searchers (the Nelsons and the Parsons) at Taboose Creek campground. The trip to Deep Springs was great with temperatures in the 70° and 80°. We collected quartz points and limonite. Found several interesting mineral specimens one complex double terminated crystal with a crest of aragonite coating on one of the points; two scepter points; and a limonite pseudomorph after pyrite. No plates were found.

After collecting and lunch we decided to go on to the Bristlecone Pine Forest where we had a spectacular view of Owens Valley and Bishop from the 9,000 foot level. Saw the Bristlecone Pines about 10,000 feet. These trees are among the oldest known - the average age is between 3000 and 4000 years old.

On our ascent down the White Mountains we visited the Grandview Mine which over-looks the Sierra Nevada to the West. There we collected some barite specimens and found some large pieces of what looked like onyx although it was much harder.

On our return to camp Ken and Elmer did more fishing and both of them limited out the day. This made for a very good potluck...Ken's rainbow trout, seafood salad, beef stroganoff, appetizers, Sheepherders bread and of course wine (what would a fish dinner be without wine). We ate and drank while watching the sun set over the cloud covered mountains to the West. Later we enjoyed another campfire and good company.

# AUGUST FIELD TRIP - (16 - 18 Aug 1991):

Please see your July Bulletin for map to Rainbow Ridge/Inyokern area. On my return trip from Big Pine I checked out the road to Rainbow Ridge and the camping site. This is a dry camp and NO campfires would be recommended here. I believe the best sites to camp are actually past the 1087 powerline tower on the left side of the road. There are plenty of places for an RV to park. There will be a Potluck Dinner on Saturday evening.

For those of you wo don't like roughing it you might want to stay in Ridge-crest. I prefer the Carriage Inn on North China Lake Blvd. Travel time to Ridgecrest is about 3 hours. The field trip will start at 8:00 AM both Saturday and Sunday.



# September 13-15, 1991 Field Trip Last Chance Canyon/Red Rock Canyon

Directions: Take SH14 or IS395 north and SH138 west to Mojave. From there continue north on SH14 to Red Rock Canyon. About 2 miles past Red Rock Canyon you will cross a painted cattle crossing on the highway (for dumb cows). You will pass a 3,000 foot marker. About 100 yards further turn right on to Red Rock - Inyokern Road which is a graded gravel road. The Searchers campsite will be 0.5 miles up the road on the right side.

What to collect: Yellow and red jasper, black agate, petrified wood, opal, geodes, nodules, chalcedony Recommended tools: Sledgehammer, gads, chisels, goggles, gloves, picks

Nearby supplies: Inyokern. Bring firewood, food, water. Dry camp.
